THE NETWORK OF EXCELLENCE ON LAND GOVERNANCE IN AFRICA





Weak land governance and insecure land rights are still major development challenges for Africa. The African Land Policy Centre (ALPC) has been mandated to spearhead the implementation of the African Union's Agenda on Land which aims at improving land policy in a regional context.

Although a growing number of countries show the political will to realize these initiatives, their implementation at the country level remains at an early stage. Many countries lack the human and institutional capacity required to implement sustainable land policies. One of the main reasons for this lack is the insufficient quality of academic programmes at African universities and institutions of higher learning.

To strengthen human and institutional capacities for implementing the AU Agenda on Land, ALPC has established a Network of Excellence on Land Governance in Africa (NELGA) in cooperation with Germany and other partners.

NELGA is a partnership of leading African universities and research institutions with proven leadership in education, training, and research on land governance. Currently, NELGA has over 70 partner institutions with tentacles in over 40 countries.

NELGA provides academic support and scholarships through DAAD to students to further their skills and knowledge in the land governance space in Africa.

As future land policymakers and land practitioners, the scholarship supports the AU Agenda on Land by bridging capacity gaps in the land governance space toward the economic and social development of the continent.



Capacity Building

NELGA works to improve land-related curricula in graduate and post-graduate training courses in quantity and quality. The network provides and facilitates academic education and training for African land professionals and practitioners.

Research

NELGA promotes research on land policy and land governance for Africa that is solution oriented, participatory, evidence-based and able to reach policy makers. The research component of NELGA aims at supplying application-oriented findings and feeding these into the political dialogue.

Research-PolicyLinkage

Develop a repository for data, indicators and information, in close cooperation with the ALPC, the RECs and governments and promote knowledge management, dissemination and networking in support of land policy and governance in Africa by enhancing the community of practice for land policy experts.

BECOMING A PIONEER RESEARCHER

- Frank Mintah, NELGA/DAAD Scholarship



Frank was a NELGA-DAAD scholar at Kwame Nkrumah University of Science and Technology (KNUST), with an MPhil degree in Planning and Land Governance. After completing his Master's in 2019, he worked with KNUST as a Research and Project Assistant before moving on as a PhD researcher at the Institute of Geography at the University of Bern, in Switzerland, on Geography and Sustainable Development.

As part of a broader Sustain–Forest Project, his research focuses on the governance arrangements that work for sustainable forest use and management in agricultural landscapes of West Africa, which the European Research Commission funds. He believes the knowledge and skills he gained through the NELGA program were extremely relevant to the research he is now undertaking.

"It gave me memories that will last for a lifetime. The programme offered the opportunity to complement my knowledge in land use planning with the governance arrangements that influence land-use decisions and land-use outcomes. Within my scholarship period, I also obtained the DAAD short-term research stay scholarship to undertake a research residency in Germany, at the Chair of **Land Management, at the Technical University** of Munich (TUM). The scholarship again allowed me to join international conferences, including the Conference on Land Policy in Africa in Addis Ababa (Ethiopia) and the Sustainable **Development for Africa Seminar at TUM** (Munich, Germany), among many other incountry research and networking events."

CELEBRATING THE PIONEER CLASS OF THE NEW NELGA LAND GOVERNANCE MASTERS AT UGB

In 2021, twenty students from across Africa made history as the first set of people to be enrolled in the new Master's Degree program on Land Governance and Territorial Management at Gaston Berger University of Saint-Louis (UGB) in Senegal. The Master's program, introduced with the help of NELGA, provides a platform to develop adequate human and technical capacities to support the development and implementation of land policies in Africa. The students are subject to an interactive and interdisciplinary pedagogy regime with continuous personal follow-up of the programme's leaders.

Prof Ibrahim Diallo, Coordinator of NELGA
Francophone West Africa and Professor of
Public Law at UGB, expressed his delight at
the new academic program welcomed by the
academic and professional world at the subregional and continental levels. The course
considers the region's peculiarities and the AU
endorsed Guidelines for the Development of
Curricula on Land Governance in Africa.

The academic program provides NELGA scholarships to the enrolled students. It ends with a mandatory internship that concretizes the orientation of the master students towards professional practice with practical experiences on topics such as land systems, land legislation, domains, spatial planning, land market, land information systems, territorial cooperation and planning, environment and climate change, impact studies, land conflicts and others.

The program prepares students for the employment market post-graduation as the internship facilitates the positioning and placement of young people in the public or private sector.

"West Africa's diversity in terms of language, colonial history, political regimes and stages of economic development has resulted in pluralistic land tenure regimes. The Master's program attempts to address such land governance issues in West Africa and offers vocational education, articulating theoretical and practical training in land governance and land management. This academic program is an asset to the region and the continent as it integrates a review of the past and possibilities for the future by investing in the young people of today with key knowledge useful for the economic and social development of continent." - Prof. Diallo
