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Federal Government/MoA Target

• Between 2021 -2030, the Ministry of Agriculture targeted to expand the mediumlarge scale agricultural investment from 986,492 ha to 4.2 million ha and in terms of production, to increase from 85 million quintals to 169 million quintals.





Capacity Gaps Need Assessment







The assessment was done at federal, two regions, 5 woredas/districts and 5 kebeles

In total 141 persons addressed and 34 of the total (24.11%) were female participants.

Information obtained during the rapid assessment from 12 persons included



Results

- Unstable institutional arrangement serious challenged implementation of responsible land governance
- Investment land identification, delineation and transfer process marginalized local authorities and local communities, including women and their institutions. It was done by federal authorities.
- Conflicts between local communities and investors' interests; conflict b/n investors and government authorities interests; conflict b/n investors themselves are found as a common feature of the land based investment



- Due Diligence process bypassed including all aspects of responsible land investment
- Availability of documents related to international and national principles/guidelines at lower levels is very scanty
- Government technical support and advise to the investors is not available or is very weak
- Productivity is not as high as expected and is not much higher than smallholders



- Modern farm management knowledge of investors is not to the level required.
- Weak monitoring and evaluation system was and is a challenge

National and international documents analysis and shared





- Side by side to the capacity needs assessment, an assessment/review of relevant documents was conducted
- In total 47 documents reviewed and documented
- Out of the total, 8 of them are legally binding documents that include proclamations and regulations issued by the Federal House of Representatives and Regional Councils
- The rest 39 are leggaly non-binding, which deal on gender and land, environmental issues, forest related matters, land graping reports, land related corruption reports and land governance in general and the likes
- Finally, 22 potential knowledge product types were presented to the GIZ-RGIL Ethiopia office for present and future concideration

MSD forums



- Bahir Dar it was conducted 29 31/03/ 2022 with 115 participant, and
- Addis Ababa, it was conducted 21 22/3/2023 with participation of 91 participants Participants were drawn from
 - Federal MoA and Ethiopia Investment Commission
 - Regional bureaus, zone and Woreda offices of administration and agricult
 - Academia, research institutions
 - Local communities, civil society organizations
 - Development partners, international consultants, and the media
- The Gambella and Bahir Dar forums combined indoor presentation and discussions that included thematic topics presentations and outdoor visits. But the Addis Ababa forum was only indoor
- In addition participants were divided in groups and discussed on four thematic topics and produced recommendations that focused on Responsible Governance of investment
- The forum was branded by backdrop and street banners, roll-us with different messages that reflect Responsible Governance of Investment in Land
- Three Proceedings with important recommondation, produced and shared
