

NELGA GOOD PRACTICES:

Improving Academic Publications through Scientific Writing Workshops

The Network of Excellence on Land Governance in Africa (NELGA) is a partnership of leading African universities and research institutions with proven leadership in education, training and research on land governance. Currently NELGA has more than 70 partner institutions in over 40 countries and is organized in 6 regional and 1 technical nodes supported by a Secretariat.



Scientific writing is the lifeblood of academia, yet it can be a formidable challenge, particularly for postgraduate students and early career researchers. The Network of Excellence on Land Governance in Africa (NELGA) recognises this hurdle and is dedicated to addressing it. NELGA, comprising leading African institutions, is committed to elevating scholarly communication and research quality.

Within NELGA's vibrant efforts, the Southern African node, represented by the Namibia University of Science and Technology (NUST), shines as a hub for nurturing scientific writing skills. NUST's collaboration with partners has led to two successful workshops, fostering research collaboration, mentorship skills, and scientific proficiency.

Turning to Central Africa, the NELGA
Central Africa node has pioneered
an online workshop, equipping
young researchers to navigate job
and scholarship opportunities in the
land sector. This initiative empowers
researchers to access and contribute
to advancements in land governance,
underlining the role of effective application
strategies and the power of networks.

Implementation

NUST has thus far successfully hosted two writers' workshops. These workshops exemplify our commitment to elevating academic excellence and scientific writing within the region.

The inaugural workshop was convened in Windhoek, Namibia, in 2018, in close collaboration between NUST and the project Advancing Collaborative Research in Responsible and Smart Land Management in and for Africa (ADLAND). Building on this success, the second workshop took place in Lusaka, Zambia, from 25 to 28 October 2022, in a collaborative effort between NUST and the University of Zambia.

NELGA's dedication to promoting comprehensive land governance education encompasses nurturing effective scientific writing practices, underpinning its resolve to elevate scholarly communication and impactful research outcomes



These workshops were meticulously designed to achieve the following key objectives:

- 1. Enhancing scientific writing skills: At the forefront of our efforts was the aim to improve the quality of scientific writing skills among participants. We recognize that the ability to articulate research findings effectively is fundamental to scholarly communication.
- 2. Support for early researchers: Another pivotal goal was to assist early-stage researchers in transforming their scientific work into publishable papers. By doing so, we seek to bridge the gap between academic research and impactful dissemination.
- 3. Promoting research collaboration: We also sought to foster greater collaboration among NELGA member universities. These workshops served as a platform for networking and knowledge exchange, thereby

increasing research collaboration. 4. Strengthening research supervision: Acknowledging the crucial role of academic

staff in guiding postgraduate students,

the workshops emphasized enhancing

research supervision and mentorship skills. This is vital for nurturing the

next generation of scholars.

In Central Africa, where many qualified young researchers grapple with the intricacies of securing employment and scholarships in the land sector, NELGA has taken proactive steps. On 26 June 2023, the NELGA Central Africa node organised an online workshop aimed at empowering these aspiring researchers.

This workshop was strategically designed to equip young researchers with the skills and insights necessary to navigate job and scholarship opportunities effectively within the land sector. Key objectives included:

Techniques for opportunity: Providing participants with practical techniques for identifying and pursuing job and scholarship opportunities in the land sector.

Understanding prerequisites: Clarifying the prerequisites for successful job and scholarship applications, ensuring that participants meet the necessary qualifications.

Effective application strategies: Educating participants on how to critically assess job and scholarship offers and respond effectively.

Emphasising best practices: Encouraging the adoption of best practices and attitudes in the pursuit of jobs and scholarships.


The power of networking: Highlighting the significance of forming connections and networks to facilitate information and experience sharing, a practice highly recommended by our panellists.
